# Take the Next Step offers friendship, help, and hope to our neighbors in need. We do this in many ways...



### Community Resource Center and Mobile Outreach

We receive 5,000 visits in a typical year. Nearly 40% of our visitors will be homeless men, women, and children.

Visitors receive immediate assistance like emergency food, financial assistance and help connecting to and navigating additional resources.

When our unhoused and other folks cannot make it into our Resource Center, we go to them three days a week to deliver food and supplies, so that we can serve everyone and help to connect with services.



#### Community Dinners and more

Every year, volunteers prepare and serve more than 5,000 dinners to our hungry and homeless neighbors. Each week hot, nutritious, and we're told, delicious, meals are free to everyone.

It's not just dinners. All together, community groups, like the Brown Bag Brigade and others, will prepare and serve more than 19,000 meals and snacks across all our programs.



#### Kidz Club and Student Leaders

70% of the children attending our nearest elementary school live in poverty...80% cannot read at grade level and 90% are behind in math.

Children living in poverty who attend high poverty schools are 10 times more likely to drop out before finishing high school. That's why we do Kidz Club.

Middle and High School Student Leaders volunteer to help younger students and serve in our community.



# Growing Together Teen Moms

At bi-monthly dinners and in between, young moms and their children connect with leaders, and mentors. They learn from each other, share resources and baby clothes and grow together. Learn more on our website.

We do all this with only three part time and three full time staff members. We rely upon more than 500 volunteers who give us 18,000 hours of their time each year and the contributions of our many generous friends.
